

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

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A federal judge in San Francisco struck down a lawsuit Thursday by the American Civil Liberties Union that claimed U.S. Health and Human Services violated the separation of church and state by allocating millions of dollars to faith-based groups that took in unaccompanied immigrant minors but refused to give them birth control or access to abortions. Filed in 2016, the lawsuit alleged groups like <u>the U.S.</u> <u>Conference of Catholic Bishops made it difficult or impossible for the</u> <u>minors, some of whom were raped or victims of sex trafficking, to obtain</u> <u>birth control.</u>
