More than 200 parishioners of <u>St. Bede Parish</u> in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, made a <u>spontaneous half-mile walk</u> to Tree of Life Synagogue Oct. 28 following the Catholic congregation's 11 a.m. mass to <u>show support and solidarity</u> with their Jewish neighbors in the wake of the Oct. 27 mass shooting at the shull that left 11 dead and several wounded.

The Reading Connection ministry in the Diocese of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, allows incarcerated women to read stories and books to their children via audio-video recordings, reports Bonny Van in the diocesan newspaper, The Catholic Commentator. The DVD and book are sent to the children, in some cases in other countries. Feedback indicates the youngsters often listen and view the recordings over and over. The Reading Connection was born of a casual conversation between exercise buddies Sandra Kuykendall, Judith Howell and Laura Adams. They eventually approached the local Catholic Charities agency which, in turn, led to

support and involvement from the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women and diocesan Prison Ministry.

Based at <u>St. Matthew Parish</u> in Norwalk, Connecticut, <u>Knights of Columbus St. Matthew Council 14360</u> recently staged its <u>fourth annual "Chili Cook-Off"</u> for <u>Al's Angels</u>, a non-profit that supports children battling cancer and other hardships. Council 14360 sustains several year-round outreach efforts.

A <u>collection of 75 meticulously created nun dolls</u> has been drawing much interest in the Archdiocese of Atlanta's Office of Archives and Records where they are on display. The assembly was donated by Margaret Alsup of Cumming, Georgia.
